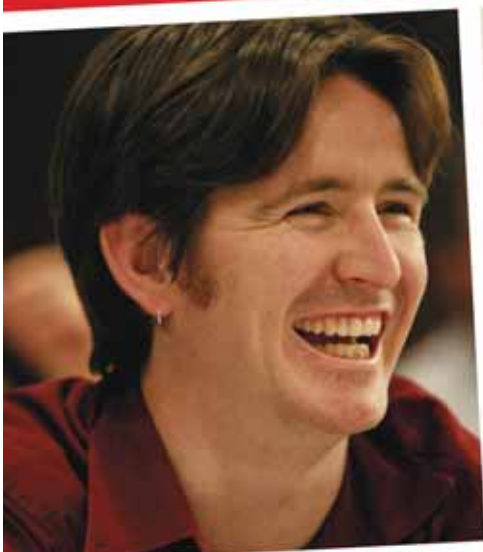
Captain (rtd) Reserve Forces Decoration (RFD). Retired from practice in 2003. Interests: music, art, travel and skiing.
